"THANKS TO VISIONCORPS, I'M LIVING MY BIRTHDAY EVERY DAY!"

In 2016, Reggie Taylor had a near-death experience, and it profoundly changed his perspective on life. He was the victim of gun violence that left him without sight and sent him into a downward emotional spiral. He credits VisionCorps with helping him get his life back on track.

"I went through a whole lot," Reggie said. "After I lost my eyes, I didn't feel whole. I didn't feel independent. But I'm here, and now, it's like I'm living my birthday every day!"

Getting around safely is a long-term goal. "I take everything one step at a time," Reggie said. "I go for walks by myself

with my white cane." He uses landmarks such as bushes, divots in the sidewalk, or the sound of chimes to orient himself. When he makes a mistake, he regards it as an adventure. "I took out the trash yesterday, and my feet didn't feel the slope. I got turned around, and had to use my cane to get back." But he's glad to have solved the problem independently.

Reggie works at improving his skills every day. "The more you stay busy, the better you sleep at night," he said. He lifts weights and rides his stationary bike. He's learning to read braille and listens to audiobooks. But he's happy to let his family do the cooking sometimes. "I just sit back and chill."

Navigating life without sight is challenging, but rewarding. Reggie is especially grateful to have found a resourceful community through VisionCorps peer support groups. "It's helped me so much; it's unbelievable. It's changed my attitude, because before, I didn't feel I had anybody I could really talk to. We learn so much from each other."

"I just take it one day at a time and keep laughing and smiling all the way," Reggie said. "Nothing is worse than what I've already been through. When you come out the other side, you realize that life is more important than anything!"

At VisionCorps, we don't just work to help provide skills and training to the client affected by vision loss – we work with their entire family and surroundings – whether that be in an office environment, retirement community staff, or family – to provide support and encouragement for a successful outcome. Because the effects of vision loss can vary drastically from client to client, every client's route to independence is different and tailored specifically to them.

Reggie is a wonderful example of a client who lost his vision suddenly and unexpectedly, experienced the emotional toll it takes on a person, and has come out on the other side confident, independent and dedicated to continuing to work towards his goals. Reggie participated in our annual fundraiser, the Eye Drop in early June. Prior to the event, Reggie had avoided large public gatherings as he continued to heal. His first venture out, he went big! Surrounded by hundreds of spectators he rappelled from the roof of a 10-story building – and did it with a smile! He is already talking about next year.

Our clients, when faced with what feels like an enormous challenge, dedicate themselves to taking advantage of VisionCorps services so they may continue to thrive in their daily lives. 2022 EYE DROP RECAP

Coming off the heels of our third Eye Drop Rappelling Event, momentum is strong for our event next year! Eye Drop is VisionCorps signature annual fundraising event in which participants commit to raise at least \$1,000 for the opportunity to rappel from the roof of the Holiday Inn in downtown Lancaster. This year, more than 80 participants took on the challenge, met it, and capped off their fundraising efforts with an exhilarating 125 foot rappel!

Funds raised from the Eye Drop benefit VisionCorps services to the community. This year, more than \$135,000 was raised through sponsorships and donations to rappellers. Our goal was to raise \$175,000, and donations are still being accepted via mail or online at www. EyeDrop2022.org (You can also click the link to watch the livestream on the website!) The combined total raised since the event started in 2019 is more than \$450,000!

Participants are able to create their own fundraising webpage. This makes it easy to send a link to family and friends via email or on social media, directing them to your own personalized page to reach your \$1000 (or more!) goal. Donations can also be made offline by mailing in a check or calling with credit card information. We work with each rappeller to support whatever method

of fundraising is easiest for them! We also provide a fundraising toolkit with fundraising ideas, letter templates to personalize, and all the details you need to know for the event. We are also actively seeking sponsors for the next event to offset the expenses so that 100% of donations go to services!

Anyone is welcome to participate as long as two criteria are met: rappellers must weigh between 100 and 300 pounds, and must safely fit in the harness. Children who meet that criteria and are under the age of 18 are able to rappel, with parental or legal guardian permission. This year, rappellers came from all counties we serve – and beyond! 
As a commercial loan officer for Peoples Security
Bank & Trust, Eric is always on the lookout for good
networking opportunities. About twenty years ago, he
became a member of the Lebanon Lions Club. "It was
basically a Who's Who of local business people," he
said. But the organization's laser focus on helping
people in need with impaired vision also attracted him.
He chaired the Lebanon County Sight Conservation
Subcommittee for upwards ten years, which brought
him into close contact with VisionCorps.

For more than 50 years, the Lebanon Lions Club has been an ally to people with sight related issues. In addition to helping fund services, several Lions members have served on VisionCorps' Board of Directors. "Until I joined the board recently, I didn't realize how deep VisionCorps' reach is – how many lives they touch on a daily basis," Eric said.

When he attended his class reunion, Eric ran into a former classmate who now works for VisionCorps. "I learned that she became legally blind in her mid-

twenties from a degenerative illness. We take our sight for granted."

Events like the Eye Drop Campaign are a good way to get young people involved. "Last year, I rappelled for the first time," Eric said. "Frankly, I was scared to death! It took me 15 minutes to step off the building. You have to trust that the harness and the ropes are going to hold you. This year was a little easier, but I still had butterflies in my belly." His wife Heather livestreamed the event and her coworkers were cheering him on. "She wants to do it with me next year!"

"It's such a phenomenal, well-run event, and it attracts a lot of spectators," Eric said. "People want to know, 'What's going on here?' And that provides the perfect opportunity to give a little testimonial for VisionCorps and the impact they're making in our community."
